What is GAA Rounders?



GAA Rounders is one of the four core codes of the Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA), uniquely embedded in the organisation since the original 1884 Charter. It is a bat-and-ball sport played across Ireland, combining athletic skill, teamwork, and fast-paced action.

Long before 1884, various bat-and-ball games were played across Ireland, passed down through generations to become what we now recognise as Rounders.

It's inclusion in the founding GAA Charter is a testament to the sport's deep roots in Irish cultural life and history.

The sport has often served as a symbol of resilience. During the Civil War, for instance, imprisoned women in Kilmainham Gaol famously played Rounders in the Stonebreaker's Yard using a chair leg for a bat and a ball made of rags.

The modern revival of the game began in the 1950s, led by Peadar Ó'Tuatáin in Derry. Since then, the organisation has experienced significant expansion. By the end of 2025, the association had grown to 67 affiliated clubs nationwide, spanning 18 of the 32 counties.

The Structure of Rounders

GAA Rounders is organised into three competitive grades across Men's, Women's and Mixed championships:

Senior Championships

- 8 teams in each of:
- Senior Men
- Senior Women
- Senior Mixed

This is the elite level of club Rounders in Ireland.



Intermediate Championships

- 8 teams in each of:
- Intermediate Men
- Intermediate Women
- Intermediate Mixed

Intermediate grade provides a competitive pathway between Junior and Senior levels.

Junior Championships

- 40+ teams compete annually across:
- Junior Men
- Junior Women
- Junior Mixed
- Junior competitions represent the largest and fastest-growing section of the sport nationwide.

Group Format & Progression

- Championships begin with group stages, starting in mid-April.
- Teams are drawn into groups of eight at each grade.
- Groups are cross-provincial, meaning clubs are not grouped solely by geography.

For example, teams from Mayo may be grouped with clubs from Cavan, Dublin, Wexford, and other counties.

This format promotes competitive balance, and avoids repetitive local fixtures. It also encourages national competition and player development

Qualification

- The top four teams in a group qualify for the All-Ireland Semi-Finals.
- Semi-final winners advance to the All-Ireland Finals.

The Championship Season Timeline

- Mid-April: Group stages commence nationwide
- Summer months: Group matches and knockout rounds
- September: All-Ireland Finals across Men's, Women's and Mixed championships
- November: The season concludes with the GAA Rounders All-Stars Awards, recognising the top players, clubs, and contributors of the year



Match Format (Quick Explainer)

- Teams consist of 9 players
- Matches are typically played over five innings, senior finals 7.
- Teams score rounds by striking the ball and completing a full circuit of the bases
- Games are fast-paced, spectator-friendly, and generally completed within a clear, broadcast-friendly timeframe

Governance & Organisation

- Governed nationally by GAA Rounders operating under the umbrella of the GAA
- Competitions are organised annually for Men, Women, and Mixed teams across Senior, Intermediate and Junior Grades.
- The season culminates in the All-Ireland Championships, where clubs from all four provinces compete for national titles.

The Game at a Glance

- Teams consist of 9 players with matches typically lasting five innings
- The objective is to score rounds by striking the ball and completing circuits of the bases
- Key skills include batting, fielding, throwing, catching, speed, and tactical awareness
- The game is fast-moving, spectator-friendly, and accessible for all ages.



Women's Involvement & Pathways

We offer robust pathways for female athletes at every level of our All-Ireland Championship (Senior, Intermediate, and Junior), providing opportunities to play in both single-gender and mixed-gender formats.

InterProvincial Championships: In 2026, for the first time, our InterProvincial Championships will feature both Men's and Women's teams, allowing female athletes to represent their provinces in a fully female-team format.

Junior Day: Scheduled for May 2, 2026, this event has traditionally seen strong support from women's teams, a trend we expect to continue this year.

In a modern context, GAA Rounders defines what an inclusive sport should be. There are no barriers to entry regarding age, gender, fitness level, or nationality. Paula Doherty Elected First Female President of GAA Rounders

Historic appointment marks a milestone for women in Irish sport and a new chapter for grassroots Rounders. GAA Rounders has entered a landmark moment in its history with the election of Paula Doherty as the Association's first-ever female President.

The announcement comes as the sport grows rapidly, with nearly 70 clubs, more than 2,500 adult players, and new clubs forming regularly.

A native of Castlebar, Co. Mayo, Doherty has been immersed in Rounders for more than three decades. Her achievements include:

- 4 Senior Women's All-Ireland titles (2022–2025)
- 2 Senior Mixed All-Ireland titles (2024, 2025)
- 3 All-Star Awards at 3rd Base (2022, 2023, 2025)

All with Breaffy Rounders.

Professionally, Paula is Programme Director and Home Economics lecturer at ATU St. Angela's, Sligo, bringing education, governance, and strategic experience to her role.

Vision: 'Rounders is part of the foundation of the GAA. Every decision we make asks: does this help all our clubs?'

Her priorities include club development, referee training, digital promotion, and nationwide communication.

Paula Doherty is the newly elected President of GAA Rounders, making history as the first woman to lead the association. A proud Castlebar native, Paula has been involved in the sport for decades, both on and off the pitch.

As a player, her record speaks for itself. Paula is a six-time All-Ireland winner and three-time All-Star. She was still competing at Senior level as recently as 2025, when she earned another All-Star for her performances and helped Breaffy secure two more All-Ireland club titles – a clear reflection of her commitment, standards and love for the game.

Away from Rounders, Paula works as Programme Director and Home Economics lecturer at ATU St. Angelas in Sligo. Her professional background in healthy living, nutrition and practical life skills strongly influences her leadership style, with a focus on balance, sustainability and lifelong participation in sport.

While she will no longer be stepping onto the pitch as a player, Paula remains deeply connected to the game. Over the coming seasons, she plans to travel across counties attending matches at every level – from Go Games at U12, right through to Senior, staying in touch with players, coaches and volunteers on the ground.

Elected for a three-year term, Paula takes on the presidency at a time of significant growth for GAA Rounders, with over two million digital engagements recorded in 2025. Her vision is to strengthen grassroots participation, increase visibility nationwide and ensure Rounders remains an inclusive, accessible sport for people of all ages.

Paula's appointment marks a landmark moment not only for GAA Rounders, but for women in Irish sport leadership. Her presidency is rooted in community, volunteerism and the core values of the GAA.
